
FOLLOW UP ON EVENTS

A FEW TIPS ON PRICKING OUT & POTTING UP SEEDLINGS BASED ON MY EXPERIENCE SO FAR

I am still a novice in growing alpines, but I have learned a few thing by trial and error and would like to pass them on, in hopes they help, or for comment.

1. <u>RESEARCH FIRST</u>: Just like for germinating seeds, do some <u>RESEARCH</u> on your plant's likes. For example I had some Campanula aucheri seedlings - I researched and found out they have a taproot, so made sure that I potted them into deep seedling pots. Saxifraga federici-augusti ssp.grisebachii seedlings like a limey, well-drained, rocky potting. Gentian seedlings don't like to be pricked out individually - its best to transplant them in clumps and wait on division until they are mature. Primula maupiensis likes damp and shade or it will fry.

2. PRICKING OUT & POTTING UP:

- --make sure the seedling compost is well dampened. Roots are less likely to be torn off and more compost will stick to the roots and that makes for better potting up. NB: some seedling don't have much root at all, but go for it anyway. I found that with Delosperma and Astragalus and they lived in spite of me!!
- --use a very small tool to prick out e.g. a chopstick, a seedspoon or or

some such. Even tweezers can help for sturdier seedlings like Saxifraga or Sempervivum- with care.

- --Hold the seedlings gently by their leaves, not stems. Stems can get broken or bruised and that is death to your seedling.
- --Use a sterile as possible a soil to pot up e.g. I mix some starter mix with some sea soil. Add any amendments like oyster shell, glacial rock dust, grit, sand (as indicated by your research). Water well (so any peat or coir rehydrates) and let settle and drain.
- --Use your pricking out tool to make a hole for the seedling, then settle the new soil gently around the roots you fingers or tool. I use a 591 ml squeezable Aquafina water bottle with a fine plastic rose topper (available from Lee Valley) to drip water gently around the seedling to make sure the soil contacts the roots fully.
- --Top with #2 or # 3 grit to deter moss growth and slugs.
- --Other pests: If your research has indicated slugs love your plant like Soldanella alpine or young Cyclamen, then use extra defenses like copper collars, copper mesh. If wood bugs love them, then sprinkling corn meal periodically around the seedlings in a ring, helps deflect them - also use corn meal traps in your trays (small plastic pots with lids and hole cut in side, full of corn meal). If aphids love your juicy seedlings, then have a squirt bottle of Safer's soap at the ready. --If it is still cold out, you will have to either keep the newly potted plants inside under grow lights and covered in vented domes to prevent them from desscating, or in a greenhouse with enough warmth not to freeze and covered in domes, or if warm enough outside put your pots in solid trays with vented domes over them and place in a shady protected area for a couple of days, then move to a partially shaded area so they get more light and don't get leggy, then as the plants grow and strengthen give them more sun as per their requirements. NB: Open and close vents or even prop up the covers as required so that the plants don't freeze or cook or get too much rain and drown. As they grow stronger and bigger and the weather improves they can be integrated into the garden.

RECIPES FOR TREATS AT THE LAST MEETING By Sue Beatty

Coconut Slice is one my Mom made when I grew up and one of my favorites - I triple it and make it on a large cookie tray and it freezes well.

Crust

1 cup flour2 tsps baking powder3/4 cup caster sugar divided1 egg2 tbs butter

Mix 1st 3 together, rub in butter and then the add the egg. Press into tray - I use parchment paper but you could butter the tray if you don't mind the extra fat

2-3 rounded tablespoons of jam - I use way more than this and I love it with strawberry or raspberry jam but I do use lemon curd and the other day I used a pumpkin spread - it's

fun to experiment. Just spread it over the base.

1 cup of coconut 1 egg remainder of caster sugar

Mix together and carefully spoon over the jam/spread. I usually make more of this so it has a good coating on it - it just never seems enough.

Bake for about 30 minutes on 340 degrees - I put it a bit lower in the oven and once the top is golden brown it's done.

Snickerdoodles - a new one I tried this Christmas and my husband loves it. This is wonderful warm out of the oven - sadly they'd cooled off by the time I got to Junes :-(11/2 cups sugar

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened

1/2 cup shortening - NOTE I NEVER USE SHORTENING OR MARGARINE SO 1 CUP BUTTER (I PROBABLY PUT IN 3/4 CUP) it may taste better with the shortening 2 eggs

2 3/4 cups unbleached flour

2 teaspoons cream of tartar

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup sugar

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon - I add cardanom too

Heat oven to 400°F.

Mix 1 1/2 cups sugar, the butter, shortening and eggs in large bowl. Stir in flour, cream of tartar, baking soda and salt.

Shape dough into 1 1/4-inch balls. Mix 1/4 cup sugar and the cinnamon. Roll balls in cinnamon-sugar mixture. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until set. Remove from cookie sheet to wire rack.
