On March 4th, Paddy found several of her Saxifraga in bloom.







WHAT'S NEW IN MY ALPINE HOUSE - David Sellars

On March 14th, David had these beauties flowering in the Alpine House:



Tulipa cretica

This tulip is endemic to the island of Crete where it grows in very large colonies. According to the Pacific Bulb Society it is rare in cultivation. I grew this from seed from the Alpine Garden Club of BC seed exchange. The seed was sown in January, 2011 and this is the first year of flowering. It is potted in sand, leaf mould and quarter inch grit.



Fritillaria gibbosa

This fritillary is native to Iran, Afghanistan and neighbouring countries where it grows in open, stony or sandy places hot in summer. It is the most widespread species of the Rhinopetalum group. It needs to be kept dry during the summer and I stop watering immediately after flowering. I got this plant from Roger Barlow in 2007 during a period when he was growing Fritillaria from seed. It is potted in sand, leaf mould and quarter inch grit.



Gardener's Calendar

When Forsythia blooms, plant first peas.

When Forsythia finishes, do last pruning of roses.

When Lily of Valley blooms, it's time to plant tomatoes.

When Mock Orange is in bloom, it's time to seed winter veg.

If dandelions are in blooms, it's time to plant potatoes.
