### SEED STARTING

Some suggestions based on my experience so far,

#### ADVANCE PREPARATION:

- I. Keep a Seed Wish List all year long.
- 2. Save Seeds & Send in to the AGCBC, AGS and SRGC Seed Exchanges

3. Order Seed (keeping in mind your wish list) from the Seed Exchanges, Commercial Sources (see suggested sources below), etc.

4. Research the germination requirements on the internet and in books. Really good internet source (thanks to June Strandberg) is the Ontario Rock Garden Society SeedEx: http://www.onrockgarden.com/germination-guide/plants

#### GET SOWING:

5. Using seed starter pots, fill with starter mix – MY BASIC MIX is about 1/2 Dutch Treat / Islands Finest Starter Mix & 1/2 #2 granite or limestone grit. This can be fine tuned for special seed needs

Some usual methods of sowing:

a. Seed scattered on surface of damp mix, lightly mist. This is SL = Surface sow, needs Light. To avoid moss growth, I suggest sowing seed onto thin layer of grit and then washing it in, using fine rose. Seems to work fine too, especially useful on seeds that take longer to germinate and where moss growth can be a problem. For really quick germinating seeds, then direct on starter mix is just fine.

b. Fine seed needing some cover – sow on surface of damp mix that is topped with  $\#_1$  (very fine seed) or  $\#_2$  grit (slightly bigger seed), water seed in with mist. This is JC = Just Cover. If the seed is bigger, use  $\#_3$  grit.

c. Bigger seed needing dark to germinate – Some seeds need soaking first. Then dampen mix, dig holes twice width of diameter of seed and cover with mix. Top with some grit to discourage moss buildup. Mist.

6. Park seed trays as per requirements determined by research:

a. Set up trays with vented domes for Outdoor Treatment seeds. This is OT. Put a rock on top or use bulldog clips to hold top on (thanks to David Sellars re: clips).

b. Set up trays covered with vented domes under grow lights on seed starting heat mats inside or in greenhouse. This is 20C

c. Put seed pots needing cold stratification in small trays inside plastic bags in lower part of fridge. Mark with date and how many weeks of stratification are needed. Mark calendar when due out. Take out at proper time and proceed to next part of requirements, e.g. 20C or OT.

d. Seeds needing gibberellic acid, GA3, treatment to soften their seed coat. I have tried Aquilegia discolor, using a 1 to 3 of vinegar and water for 20 hours and succeeded. This also works for some Gentiana that need GA3. I am just now having success with G. verna.

e. Some seeds need scarification – they tend to be big and have tough outer coats – you can rub on fine sandpaper or put them in a baggie with grit and give them a good rub. I did the latter with success on Astragalus patagonicus and followed up with a warm soak for 48 hours, a success.

f. Soaking – use warm water and keep warm by putting the dish on a hot mat or over a light bulb. Some seeds benefit from a drop of detergent added, e.g. cyclamen, as it breaks surface tension so the seeds fall to the bottom and absorb water better.

g. Smoke – some seeds that germinate only after being in a wildfire (pyrophiles), like those from the South African Veldt and Australian Outback. You can give liquid smoke a try. James L. Jones in NARGS Rock Garden Quarterly vol. 66:3, Summer 2008, p. 213, tried 1:25 of Liquid Smoke to Water for 2 hours. He found it worked in half his test cases, whereas straight water did not. Diana Chapman of Telos Rare Bulbs used alfalfa straw smoke successfully on Australian seeds. See AGCBC Bulletin 56:3, Summer 2013, pp. 60-61.

NB: Every pot should have a TAG showing Latin Name, treatment abbreviations and date sown. Set up a Propagation Logbook too to record the name, treatment needed, how many seeds and pots sown, date sown, when germination noted, how many seedlings, when potted up, potting up details (e.g. acid or lime, size of grit, leaf mould), references to photos or write-ups drawn from your wishlist. This will help you to creat plant tags for sales and botanical tags for your garden. Also a great reference for future years' seed starting.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR SEED STARTING OF PARTICULAR GENUSES:

GENTIANA: Somespecies(likeG.acaulis&G.verna)needhelptobreakdormancy-Gibberellic acid, GA3. A bit of vinegar in a warm water soak for 24hrs can do the job. Seeds are very small so need to be either sown on top of mix, SL, or on fine grit and misted in. 20C can work.

SAXIFRAGA: They need light to germinate -

For Kabschia group, use small seed pots with mix of perlite and sand, settle the mix and put layer of sand on top, then light sprinkle of # 1 or # 2 grit on top. Water pot from bottom. Sprinkle seed on the grit and mist in. After that, either on hot mat under dome under light or OT under dome. Both have worked for me with OT having the edge.

# STARTING BULBS

GENERAL: IAN YOUNG'S BULB SEED STARTER MIX USED BY MIKE MILLER AND JUNE STRANDBERG:

June writes: "These seeds/bulbs stay in the pot for 2 years or more, seed starter mix does not hold up long enough.

The mix to use is:

2 parts grit, 2 parts loam, 1 part leaf mold or peat - do not use coir unless very thoroughly washed (re throwing coconuts into the sea to soften up and the fibre getting salty)

I always add I part sand as it is hard to get here the sandy loam they get in Scotland."

#### KNOW YOUR PLANT GROUP FOR BULB SEED SOWING:

Jack Brownless of the SRGC noted that "Monocots seem to like company and germinate well when sown close together." (SRGC The Rock Garden # 92, p. 331) Monocots have one seed leaf inside the seed which may or may not come out on germination: families in the

#### MONOCOTS:

Amaryllidaceae = Galanthus, Narcissus, Pancratium, Sternbergia Araceae = Arisarum, Arum, Biarum, Dracunculus Iridaceae = Crocus, Gladiolus, Iris, Romulea Liliaceae which has many subfamilies and includes these genuses – Allium, Anacamptis, Anthericum, Asphodeline, Asphodelus, Androcymbium, Bellevalia, Cephalanthera, Chionodoxa, Colchicum, Convollaria, Dactylorhiza, Drimia, Epipactis, Epipogium, Erythronium, Fritillaria, Gagea, Gennaria, Gymnadenia, Himantoglossum, Hyacinthella, Lilium, Limodorum, Listera, Melanthium, Merendera, Muscari, Neotiia, Nigritella, Ophrys, Orchis, Ornithogalum, Paris, Platanthera, Polygonatum, Scilla, Serapias, SpiranthesTrillium, Tulipa, Veratrum, Zigadenus

Dicots have two seeds leaves that may come out on germination: family groups in the DICOTS: Aristoochiaceae = Aristolochia Berberidaceae = Bongardia, Gymnospermium, Leontice

Fumariaceae = Corydalis Geraniaceae = Geranium Oxalidaceae = Oxalis Primulaceae = Cyclamen Ranunculaceae = Anemone, Ranunculus

#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR GENUSES:

# CYCLAMEN - THERE ARE MANY SYSTEMS BUT THIS ONE SEEMS TO WORK: -- FRESH SEED: sow immediately

--DRIED SEED: soak in dish of water on hot mat for 24 - 48 hours, with/without drop of detergent and rinse well, discard floaters.

Deep pots (the seedlings will stay in these for at least 18 months up to 3 years, so need to be large and deep enough). Fill bottom of pot with extra rich mix, then rest of pot to within 1/2 inch of top with mix of starting mix, leaf mould, grit and perlite. Tamp down to make even surface. and put on thin layer of sand. Arrange seeds about 2 inches apart. Cover with about 5mm of #1 grit (they need dark to germinate) and water with fine spray. Then can put on hot mat under dome and move outside when weather improves. Keep damp but not soaked. I started seed mid February and had sprouts in 4 months. Protect from slugs, snails and wood bugs. Use copper mesh against the slugs and snails and moats of cornmeal against the woodbugs.

#### FRITILLARIA:

Ian Young in his bulb log recommends planting Frits in a clump and relatively deep in a deep pot – Frits like to be cozy and spend a lot of their early life mining deep in their pots – I had success sowing in July 2011 under a hearty layer of #3 grit in deep pots and keeping OT in a part shaded location. They sprouted & made leaves starting March 2012. Now to see if they come back in 2013.

# BULB SEED ADVICE

#### By June Strandberg

Good sized pots are the ones Roger Barlow uses to grow his rock garden plants, e.g. 'Proven Winners' pots. I put a square of window screen in the bottom of the pot to keep out woodbugs. Fill with soil to 1/4" of top and tap to firm.

Narcissus: Make a hole in the soil with your finger about 1" deep and sow all seeds - cover with soil and top with #2 or #3 grit. The seeds like company and the resulting small bulbs will sort out themselves and should be left undisturbed for at least 2 years, (If you do have a larger number of seeds you scatter over the whole surface of pot and cover with about 1"soil, press in well and top with grit)

Western Erythronium: Soak seeds overnight and sow fairly thick, just cover with soil and top with  $#_2$  grit.

Lilies, fritillaries and other flat seeds: Sow shallowly and fairly thick. If you don't have a lot of seeds to deal with you can turn them edge-wise. Cover with soil, top with  $#_2$  grit and press in well.
