#### VISIT TO GARDEN OF VEL RHODES & DAN SCHWARZ

# Report and photos by June Strandberg, with additional photos from Vel Rhodes

On May 12<sup>th</sup> a group of us drove over The Hump to Port Alberni to see Vel and Dan's garden. We had a beautiful day and the garden was wonderful. First, an herbaceous border full of plants - peonies, lilies, columbines, foxgloves, poppies, lupins, roscoea and lots more. All backed by rhododendrons and partly shaded by a dove tree.

Next is the spot earmarked for the proposed rock garden! Opposite, against the house, are shade-loving plants like Spotty Dotty.

We went on past the (as yet) empty vegetable garden, past the redbud and sequoia,

through the woods to the primula, blue poppies and specimen trees. All kinds of native N American wild flowers grow here like *Erythronium*, *Trillium* and shooting stars but these are already over (with nice fat seed pods!) On a little farther and we come to some new plantings of rhododendron and azalea and most probably some new and interesting trees of Dan's.

Back on and around and we come to the 'Blow Downs'

These are huge Douglas Fir that came down during one of our storms when the winds came from the Pacific and hit the trees on their non-braced side. These winds come, every now and then, in kind of streams and take out long, narrow swathes of trees. Vel has made good use of the up-ended roots of one of these trees by chipping out all the dirt (I think her daughter helped!) and planting clematis to clamber up and blue poppies in front. Note the new tree waiting for the work party!



Dan has already dug dirt from in front to make room for all the chippings We came out to another border, more shade this time with, amongst many other plants, hostas, orchids and more primula.

These come in all sizes, many will bloom later in the season - mostly are self sown. Dan got a pink one on one of their visits to the States - it bloomed last year somewhat pink and Dan has high hopes for its seeds.

We ended up seeing some of the front garden that we didn't even know was there!



I guess we ran out of time last year that being our first visit - the garden is huge!! I think it is here that we saw the bean tree (Catalpa bignoniodes) that Dan grew from seed - I think he said it doesn't make beans. To round off a wonderful visit on a warm day, we had ice cold water on the new patio beside Vel's plants and the potted tomatoes etc designated for the vegetable garden. This garden will be covered with a plastic tunnel, Port Alberni having a far wetter Fall season than we do on our side of the mountain. We had a thoroughly full and interesting day.
